Ordinary Democracy is the first book-length work to engage recent debates in democratic theory about sovereignty, affect, subjectivity, and citizenship in conversation with recent mass movements. Ordinary Democracy argues that protests against the claims of economic necessity and state security that justify unilateral assertions of state sovereignty and decision-making by unelected bodies are far from symbolic. Written with close attention to organizing practices, Ordinary Democracy reveals an attention across these movements to affective practices and spectacle meant to assist and inspire citizens in responding to moments of crisis and emergency. Ordinary Democracy challenges theorists of democratic exemplarity whose hopes for renewal assume an undiminished reserve of agency and who imagine democracy without the state. It finds that efforts to address the attachments contemporary subjects have to sources of political and economic impasse and impassivity are central to the movements' aims of democratizing the sovereign authority of the nation-state and its institutions. This book is written as a work of and argument for the value of public philosophy that closes the distance between the study of politics and political life today.
